

Parent Engagement

Alta Head Start provided many family engagement activities over the course of the year.





Alta Head Start utilized Strengths,
Needs, Interests Parent Survey (SNIPS)
and Family Outcomes Survey (FOS)
from CCR Analytics as well as the
Parent Gauge Program to collect data
on family progress and growth.

Several parent meetings included guest speakers relating to topics including the benefit of routines, the importance of being a leader in your child's education, and the power of positive parenting. All of these were held in person and virtually.

The parents were given several opportunities for parent education through the Incredible Years Parent

Education Program that was offered three times a year, Triple P Seminars and Triple P Discussion groups held monthly, as well as, with Ohio State University Extension
Parent Nutrition Education Program.
We also used Ready4K, which is an

activities to do with their child throughout
the school year.

Many parents took advantage of these opportunities which resulted in more parent engagement.




Head Start is a comprehensive child development program which serves children age three to compulsory school age. The overall goal of Head Start is to increase school readiness and social competence in young children in low-income families, helping them to meet the kindergarten readiness goals. Our Head Start programs as well as other Head Start programs in Ohio have their education curriculum in alignment with State Pre-K Standards. Children participate in a variety of educational activities that reflect best practices in early childhood education.





Designed for children 0-3 years of age, this full-day, full-year program provides enrichment and sensory stimulation to their minds, preparing them for the learning process in either a center-based option or a home-based option. Unique to this program are services to pregnant women, providing them with support and education to assist them on their journey to motherhood.

In Early Head Start we support early bonding and attachment in the child-parent relationship and child caregiver relationships. Once the children turn 3 years old, they transition into our Head Start program.

School Readiness

The Alta Head Start Program prepares children for kindergarten by providing them the opportunities to learn in group settings, ensuring they are socially and emotionally ready for kindergarten. A total of 280 children transitioned into kindergarten at the end of the 2022-2023 school year. To prepare these children and families, quarterly transition materials were shared with the families.

Children's developmental outcomes are assessed throughout the school year utilizing Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP). The DRDP is an ongoing observation system that the program uses to assess children ages 6 weeks to 5 years old.
